SHEEP ATTACKED BY DOGS

We have had reports of serious attacks on sheep in the Ford area. Please keep your dogs on a lead when walking on public footpaths across farmland.

Staying legal in England and Wales:

Under the Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953, if a dog worries sheep on agricultural land, the person in charge of the dog is guilty of an offence. The Act considers sheep worrying to include attacking sheep, chasing them in a way that may cause injury, suffering, abortion or loss of produce or being at large (not on a lead or otherwise under close control) in a field or enclosure in which there are sheep.

It is every dog's instinct to chase, even if they are usually obedient and good with other animals.

Chasing by dogs can do serious damage to sheep, even if the dog doesn't catch them. The stress of worrying by dogs can cause sheep to die and pregnant ewes to miscarry their lambs.

Sheep fleeing from dogs are often killed or seriously injured by their panicked attempts to escape, causing untold damage to fences and field boundaries in the process.

Dogs chasing ewes and lambs can cause mis-mothering issues, with lambs dying from starvation or hypothermia when they become separated from their mother and fail to find her again.

Dog bites can cause death in sheep or necessitate them being put down at a later date, or in less severe cases considerable veterinary bills and additional welfare issues as a result of flies being attracted to the blood and leading to a nasty health problem in sheep called 'fly strike'. Injuries to sheep can also delay the normal farming routine, be it the mating season or administration of vital medicines and vaccines.

It is an offence to allow a dog to worry sheep. Worrying includes attacking or chasing sheep and, in some circumstances.



Farmers are legally entitled to shoot dogs if they are endangering their sheep.

It is vital that you keep your dog on the lead around livestock, even if you can usually trust it to come to call. If you live in or near a farming area, you must make sure that your dog cannot escape from your property, as it may find its way onto land containing sheep.

We have recently been told that to carry out any works on trees on your land, you must obtain permission from AVDC if your property sits within the Conservation Area of the Parish.

The trees don't have to have individual Tree Preservation Orders (TPO's) on them.

All trees in a conservation area are protected and all works must be approved.

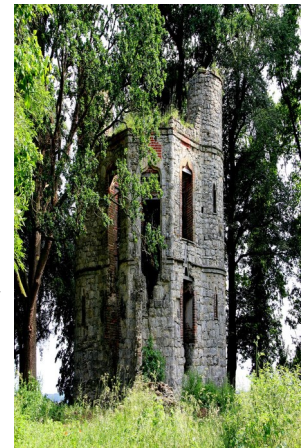

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING Held on 9th April 2019—Dinton Village Hall

Chairman of the Council's Annual Report to the Parish

A year ago, there was anticipation that this might be my last report. As with the other issue looming over us the question of the nature of the civil administration of Buckinghamshire is a little clearer. In May 2020 a new unitary authority will be in place and new parish council elections held.

In digesting these issues, GDPR and endless others I must thank the resilience of my fellow councilors and officers; there are still vacancies on the council. Jon Horn (vice chairman), Honor Vane, Mel Kidner, Dick O'Driscoll, and Anne Dunne have all proved to be as hard working and resourceful as ever effectively communicating with the relevant bodies.

The other person who ensures a constant and safe course in our deliberations is Keith Gray, our Parish Clerk, with his advice and expertise. He also took on the role of Responsible Financial officer, aided by Janet Turner.

The recent election of a new District Councilor, David Lyons, compliments the longstanding experience of Judy Brandis and Brian Foster who prove so helpful to us. Our County Councilor, Paul Irwin, has helped in resolving some of the issues regarding roads through Ford and adjacent to the Church. even if the ideal solution is elusive.

The continued hard work of David Hobden, our Tree Warden, with Jon Horn merits special thanks, ensuring tree maintenance within the Parish and in the Spinney on the Parish field. One hesitates to think who will take on David's role so well, should he retire.

The other people who quietly and efficiently work are Steve Webb and his team from Aylesbury Town Council working under the devolved services agreement. At present we have not had a clear indication as to future devolved services but given the state of County and District finances it would seem only a matter of time.

There have unfortunately been a number of upsetting problems in the last year. Several burglaries occurred in the Parish which is a concern and Sue Jones will talk about them. Dog fouling and not picking-up mess is a real nuisance and whilst answers have been suggested, enforcement is never easy. The same is true of the upset caused by large lorries attending building works via narrow lanes and tight corners. Judging by the size of some of the schemes this will need close monitoring. On the positive side we thank the anonymous donor who contributed to the repainting of the War Memorial railings; much appreciated. We planted an oak tree to commemorate the end of World War One.

The good weather of March meant this year with an excellent turnout in Ford and in Dinton we collected a huge amount of litter, only to find more fly-tipping the next day!

The donations from the Marquee Fund and the Beer festival towards initiatives in the Parish were much appreciated.

The council as always has considered plenty of planning applications, trying to ensure residents are aware of the and potential ramifications. We do not however make the final decision; that id AVDC. The Curious weather of 2018 was rough justice for one event; The Fete. As you will be aware the Fete committee has stood down en-bloc and we wait to see if it will resurrect in 2020. The person who has given so much time and energy for past years of success is Sylvia Eaton, for whom this year must have been bitter sweet. We would like to acknowledge her years of commitment by giving her a Certificate of Appreciation.

With new ideas and the development of a Community-Led plan I would hope that new and younger blood the Parish flourish. Given that this Parish and its residents as well as the country runs on volunteers' time and generosity here will be no different,

BUCKINGHAMSHIRE COUNCIL - A new Unitary Council

The Structural Changes Order - the final piece of legislation to begin setting up the new council - has now been passed by government. All current district and county councils will be abolished. All of the county and district councillors (202 in total) must come together to create a Shadow Authority to oversee the setup of the new council. Its first meeting took place on 3 June 2019 and considered the appointment of interim statutory officers: the head of paid service; monitoring officer and chief finance officer. The Shadow Executive will consist of 17 councillors; eight from the county council, eight from the district councils, and the Leader of the county council. The interim council will meet every two weeks after that during this transition phase up to go live in April 2020.

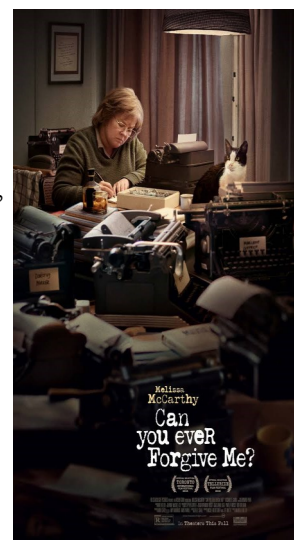

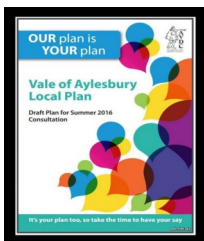

VALE OF AYLESBURY LOCAL PLAN (VALP)

AVDC is currently working on the independent Planning Inspector's latest communication about further changes to parts of the draft Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP), which will guide development up to 2033. The Planning Inspector held two weeks of public hearings last summer, and then asked the council to look again at parts of the plan. This included how much new housing will be needed in the Vale, the best places for it and more detail on future infrastructure.

The Inspector will need to see any changes to the VALP that AVDC suggests, and there will also need to be a six-week public consultation period on any changes before a final plan can be approved and adopted for use. AVDC says it is doing all it can to deliver the final adopted VALP without any unnecessary delay and will continue to update residents.

New TV series showcases fly tipping enforcement in Buckinghamshire

The exhaustive work carried out by County Council enforcement officers in the war against fly tippers in Buckinghamshire features in a brand new Channel 5 documentary series starting this week.

The six-part programme, 'Grime and Punishment' follows the hidden army of Council enforcement teams and inspectors up and down the country who work tirelessly to nail those who think nothing of blotting the country's towns and countryside with their mess and rubbish.

As one of a number of local authorities featured, Buckinghamshire was selected because of its zero-tolerance approach to fly tipping and continuing success in bringing perpetrators to justice. Film crews followed the work of two enforcement officers, David Rounding and Matt Shutter as they hunted for clues and interviewed witnesses to help bring fly tippers to justice. On average, one fly tipper is successfully prosecuted in Buckinghamshire every week, one of the highest rates in the country. The County Council's message is clear: "Fly tippers are not welcome and we will use the full force of the law to prosecute whenever possible". Through the hard work of people like David and Matt, we are now seeing a reduction in fly tipping across the county for the first time in six years, which is great news. People have a legal responsibility to make sure that whoever is removing their rubbish for them deals with it properly and according to the law—otherwise the householder could find themselves in court! The last thing the County Council wants to do is knock on someone's door having found their waste dumped by an unscrupulous trader they might have used in good faith. Programmes like Grime and Punishment help get those important messages across. Commentating on their appearance, David and Matt said: "Its all in a day's work for us. Whether we're visiting fly tips, giving advice to local residents or preparing cases for court, our single aim is to rid Buckinghamshire of fly tipping for good. Everything we do that helps towards achieving this means a better, cleaner environment for our residents."

The first episode of Crime and Punishment started at 8pm on Thursday, (June 13th) on Channel 5. David and Matt's work in Buckinghamshire features in episode five, scheduled to air at 8pm on Thursday, July 11. The series was filmed by multi-award winning Lambent Productions Ltd, based in Brighton.
