Editorial

Now Thomas (also known as Didymus^[a]), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!" But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!"

John 20:24-26

Seeing is believing and Easter is about faith and a journey. That journey accompanies Jesus from a village called Bethany where he raised Lazarus from the dead, then Jesus' entry to Jerusalem, followed by his betrayal and arrest. There were then a number of fake trials and interrogations, a bungled investigation and the judicial murder. The different political groups and religious leadership were brought together over their hatred of the man Jesus. They thought death would be the end of it. His disciples were scattered and leaderless.

Then rumours circulated of Jesus being seen alive. The women followers had found his borrowed tomb to be empty. The story, or that part of it, ends with an evening walk to a village called Emmaus where he was identified as the risen Lord.

At each scene in this journey, we are like bystanders, asked what we believe is going on. Throughout Lent we have been studying key moments in life of St Peter, how he repeatedly failed and made mistakes. We can sympathise with him and Saint Thomas, doubting Thomas. Saint Thomas had been absent and had heard these rumours of life. He boldly refused to accept them unless he saw for himself.

The challenge for us is to believe the story. We are invited to join him on that journey of change and rumours of life turning into the evidence of our own experience.

April fool

The fool says in his heart, "There is no God." They are corrupt, their deeds are vile; there is no one who does good.

Psalm 14:1

King David sounds a bit over critical in this psalm but the word "fool" probably means an evil person.

No-one knows how April Fools Day started but the annual celebration, set aside for pranks and jokes may have begun in ancient times. The Romans liked a good joke and the idea of turning the natural order of things upside down was good fun. Perhaps it also had some connection with the New Year which was celebrated in Spring in the Middle Ages.

Usually the butt of a joke was a young apprentice or servant. Sometimes people were sent on a "fool's errand" to get pigeon's milk, hen's teeth or a glass hammer. In the north of England a fool was called an "April Gowk". A local trick was when a young employee's colleagues changed his clocks an hour forward and he turned up an hour early for work.

There have some good ones over the years including the famous spaghetti harvest in a Panorama television programme and when the Guardian newspaper had a feature on San Serif Island. It is always difficult to tell which stories in newspapers are serious or not as the genuine news is hard to believe. A really good April Fool seems to be dying out. Perhaps we live in a more serious world. A really good April

fool has to be clever, not mean spirited, and just about believable.

I am delighted that this year if you have a good suggestion for an April Fool you can apply for a grant to develop the idea. Special April Fool Information Offices have been set up across the country. Look out for these and take your idea to one of these and they will consider if it merits developing. Remember a silly idea is not just for April but all the year round. The office closes at 12 noon.

Letter from Aston Sandford

Medieval Easter

Having in the last few months looked at Medieval Church celebrations of Harvest, Christmas and Candlemas, it is time to look at Medieval Easter Day. Once again I am indebted to Nicholas Orme's *Going to Church in Medieval England* (Yale, 2021) for much of what follows.

On Easter Day in parish churches matins was held early in the morning or even at dawn (at night in cathedrals and monasteries). Before the service a new Paschal candle, a white one sometimes called the Easter candle, was blessed and lit; it was used throughout Easter week and every Sunday and festival days until Ascension Day. During the preceding Lent period the altar had been 'veiled' - a large curtain, the Lenten veil, was hung across the



chancel thus obliterating the altar from view for Lent. Any side altars remained visible. But all crosses and images were also covered with veils. After the lighting of candles the clergy processed to the high altar and ceremoniously removed all the veils. It was only then that the bells were rung for matins.

From 1215 all parishioners 'over the age of discretion' (Orme suggests this was the age of puberty) were required to take communion (or 'housel' as it was called) on Easter Day and were expected to have attended confession. Failure to do so brought the threat of exclusion from church and from Christian burial. However all public sinners, such as prostitutes, and anyone excommunicated, were excluded from taking communion. No food or even sexual activity was to have been taken or indulged in before taking the sacrament.

These requirements must have brought practical problems. As Orme points out, in a small parish (like Aston Sandford) a church could cope with the number of what he calls 'the houseling people' but what happened in larger conurbations? The answer seems to have been to have permission to hold two masses, one at night and one in the morning. Orme suggests that one benefit of that arrangement was that servants did not have to attend at the same time as their employers.

The giving of communion in medieval times could possibly justify an article in its own right, but it is worth noting that the congregation probably went up to receive communion in order of rank, and maybe men first in each 'category'.

Parish News 6 April 2023

Easter of course brings an end to the penitentiary period of Lent. In those days people had abstained from meat and dairy products for the whole period <u>and</u> had fasted before attendance at mass. So the matins service was seen as an end of food restrictions, to the extent that the congregation took meat, cheese, milk or eggs to church with them so that, after communion, the food could be blessed and sprinkled with Holy Water.

There was even an assumption that on Easter Day only food blessed in that way should be eaten. The food blessing was supposed to happen after mass, and not at the altar; it was considered highly inappropriate if the food blessing was given at same time as the mass was distributed, but it did happen. Worse still, as can be imagined it was not uncommon for attendees, after they have taken communion, to start eating in church the food (and indeed drink) they had brought with them. Orders forbidding the consumption of food and drink in church were however hard to enforce.

Fortunately there is little danger of any of such transgressions in churches these days – other than over-consumption of certain chocolate eggs! Aston Sandford's Easter Service will be at 11 00am on Easter Day. We will <u>not</u> be holding our usual monthly service on the following Sunday, 16th April.


A new vicar has a dreadful introduction, the poor are still with us and sheep may safely graze in Stone.

<u>Inducted</u>

Rev. V. L. Whitechurch was instituted and inducted into the living of Stone and Hartwell on Thursday night, in the presence of a large congregation in Stone Parish Church. The Bishop of Buckingham performed the ceremony, and the presentation was made by Miss Lee in the name of the trustees of Hartwell Estate - Mrs. Philip Lee, Messrs J. W. and E. H Freshfields.

Others who took part in the service were: J. W. Todd and K. L. Woodford (churchwardens, Stone) and T.Carter churchwarden. Hartwell. Revs. E. Snow, of Aylesbury (who acted Bishop's chaplain), E. C. (Dinton). G. Bruce-Rhind (Haddenham), Percy Taylor (Cuddington), L. K. Morton (Walton). W. H. Harper (Monks Risborough), and T. Humphreys (Aylesbury). After the ceremony the Bishop, addressing the congregation, said he rejoiced to think that the people in Hartwell and Stone had had placed in their midst one who came not as an untried priest God, not as an immature and inexperienced minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ, but rather one who necessity had a wonderful knowledge of human nature for the reason that had ministered to the souls of men not only in the large town of Aylesbury, but also in the a country parish of Blewbury in Berkshire, and who had

also much other experience. Speaking the future the Bishop appealed the people to support and COoperate with the new incumbent, and not start in the spirit of criticism. We are not all alike." He said. " and he may be found perhaps to be somewhat different from those who have gone before. I ask vou to receive him in the spirit of love and confidence: I ask you for co-operation."

As I write, snowflakes are drifting past the window and the Gas Board has sent me an email on how to deal with frozen pipes! I hope the weather prospects are brighter when you read it! We will be celebrating the great feast of EASTER in the middle of this month, Easter cards full of sunshine and spring flowers will be sent and received, it is a festival of joy and light.

Yet the account of the first Easter morning [John's Gospel, 20, 1-3] begins in darkness:

"Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb."

Contrasting with our celebration of a bright Easter morning – all those daffodils and sunshine – the story of Jesus' resurrection begins in the dark. His friends are grieving, confused and afraid; they fear the body of their friend has been stolen, his grave desecrated. With all they had witnessed of Jesus – his love in action – perhaps there was a spark of hope as they saw the empty tomb, but it seems to have been quickly snuffed out.

We can be so worn down by bad news that the most difficult thing to believe is good news; it's hard to hope when it is still dark. Like the disciples, we can become disorientated by relentless darkness in the news and in our lives; we begin the draw the worst possible conclusions from every situation.

But with Jesus, even while it is still dark, it is safe to assume the best. The greatest moment in history took place in the dark. **He is risen indeed! ALLELUIA!**

Parish News 15 April 2023

Interesting people in Stone, no 3, the literary Longfords at Peverel Court and Stairways, 1930s



On December 29, 1929. the Dowager Lady Longford, widowed at Gallipoli, bought the Peverel Court Estate (now Bartletts) from the Lees, including the two servants' cottages opposite (now Stairways). Severely crippled with arthritis, she moved from Aston Hall, Oxfordshire, with her two daughters, Violet and Julia, who were being presented in London. Pathways were

made round the grounds for her to drive her baby Austin. Her son Frank Packenham, later 7th Earl, socialist and unpopular supporter of difficult causes,

married Elizabeth Harman in 1931 and they moved into Stairways, where they entertained numerous intellectual and political friends, from Hugh Gaitskell to John Betjeman and many Oxford friends, who often called in to the Spread Eagle in Thame on the way, despite the risk of eviction by irascible landlord John Fothergill. Frank and Elizabeth's first two children, Antonia and Thomas, were christened at



Hartwell church, Thomas the last baby baptized before the decaying church was closed (below).



When not in London enjoying the Season, the young Longfords and Pakenhams enjoyed frequent hunting, playing golf in Waddesdon Park (by kind permission of Mrs James de Rothschild), and swimming in the muddy river at Eythrope. At home they sat round the fire stitching delicate underwear and gossiping, and on Sundays hurried over to Hartwell Church in time for the very sparsely attended early service.

Lady Longford died in 1933 but the houses were unsold until the late 1930s, when Stairways was bought by retired missionary and methodist minister George Woodford and Peverel itself to the Royal London Mutual Assurance Company, then after the war to the Regional Hospital Board.

The Longfords and their spouses were and still are an amazing literary family, starting with the Dowager Lady Longford's memoirs – "The Pebbled Shore" - and those of daughter Violet (married to writer Anthony Powell). These books all include descriptions of living at Peverel.

Out of Frank and Elizabeth's family of eight, five were writers. Elizabeth herself produced 14 historical biographies. Their first son, (the baby in the christening photo above) historian Thomas, now the 8th Lord Longford, wrote books on of the Victorians, the Boer war – and trees; second child Antonia (Fraser) was a historian, biographer and novelist (later married to playwright Harold Pinter). Rachel (Billington) was a novelist, Judith (Kazantzis), a poet and activist. Journalist Catherine died in a road accident in 1969.
