

Oh! I Do Like to be Beside the Seaside!

Going to the seaside for holidays was popularised by the royalty, starting with Brighton and their patronage from King George IV, and then Queen Victoria's promotion of the Isle of Wight and Ramsgate in Kent. Holidays remained the privilege of the wealthy until the development of the railways in the 1840s offered cheap travel to fast-growing resort towns. These included the seaside towns in the north west which benefitted from the industries which shut down for a week to service and repair machinery when the whole work force would have the time off. "Bracing sea air", fun and rest were seen as health giving.

Spending time at the seaside is still thought to have health benefits. *Cornwall Healthwatch* tells us that,

"Simply staring out to sea can change our brain wave frequency, luring us into a mild meditative state. The colour blue is associated with feelings of calm and peace and listening to the ebb and flow of waves and the swell of the sea naturally soothes and relaxes the brain."


An article in the *York Press* explains, "The concept of "blue mind" ... suggests that spending time near water has a calming and restorative effect on our brains. Gazing at the vastness of the sea appears to lower stress hormones like cortisol, promoting feelings of tranquillity and reducing anxiety.

There are a few hospitals that were built at the seaside. Sea air was thought curative for people suffering from lung and breathing problems. There were a number of sanatoria built for patients suffering from tuberculosis in the days before the widespread use of antibiotics.

A popular song which brings thoughts of the seaside is "I Do Like to Be Beside the Seaside".

"I Do Like to Be Beside the Seaside" was a popular British music hall song. It was written in 1907 by John H. Glover-Kind (1880 – 1918) and made famous by music hall singer Mark Sheridan, who first recorded it in 1909. Sheridan also recorded less well known songs such as " "Belgium Put the Kibosh on the Kaiser", "I'd Like to Shake Shakespeare" and a musical burlesque called "Gay Paree".

The song speaks of fun and games at the seaside and annual Summer holidays.



It was composed at a time when the yearly visits of the British working class to the seaside were booming. It was used as a signature tune for a long time by Reginald Dixon MBE, who was the resident organist at the Tower Ballroom, Blackpool between 1930 and 1970. Its jaunty tune evocative of the classic bucket and spade, British seaside holiday.

I'll be beside myself with alee and there's lots of girls beside. I should like to be beside, beside the seaside. beside the sea!



BUCKINGHAMSHIRE THE LITTLE GUIDES BOOK First published in 1903 revised 1950

(Continuing in our series of extracts from 'Buckinghamshire – The Little Guides')

CHEARSLEY

Chearsley is a small village on high ground on the side of the Thame Valley. The cottages lie along the broken ground very



prettily. The church is to the south of the village down a steep lane. It has a west tower built in the first half of the 15th century with turret, nave, and chancel. The marks of the high-pitched roof can still be seen in the tower. This church is now marked chiefly by perpendicular features. The fine font with early 13th century circular bowl fluted below with cable and flower ornaments above is to be noted. In the floor of the chancel almost immediately beneath the reading desk is a well-preserved brass to John Frankeleyn and his wife Margaret 1472.

Currently, the cupboards contain a selection of books for all ages



Wildlife Spotlight - The Rise of Parakeets in Buckinghamshire

Buckinghamshire, has recently become home to an unexpected avian resident—the parakeet. Even spotted in Stone and Haddenham! These vibrant, green birds, once an exotic sight, are now commonly seen across the county, and the south east of England.

Origins and Release into the Wild

Parakeets, specifically the ring-necked parakeet (Psittacula krameri), are native to the Indian subcontinent and sub-Saharan Africa. Their presence in the UK is believed to date back to the mid-20th century, with one popular theory suggesting that a small number of birds escaped from the sets of Pinewood Studios in the 1950s. Another



account says that some birds were released by an aviary owner in West London around the same time. While the exact origins of their introduction remain shrouded in mystery, what is clear is that these birds have adapted remarkably well to their new environment.

Thriving in Urban Areas

Parakeets have thrived in urban areas across Buckinghamshire and beyond, thanks to their adaptable nature. Unlike many other species that struggle with habitat changes, parakeets have found urban parks, gardens, and woodlands to be ideal habitats. Their diet, consisting mainly of seeds, nuts, berries, and fruit, is readily available in these environments. Additionally, urban areas offer fewer natural predators, allowing the parakeet population to grow unchecked.

One of the key factors in their success is their ability to nest in a variety of locations. Parakeets often use tree cavities and even holes in buildings for nesting, making urban settings particularly accommodating. The mild climate of southern England also plays a significant role, providing an environment that closely mimics their native habitats.

Characteristics of Parakeets

Ring-necked parakeets are easily recognizable by their bright green feathers, long tails, and distinctive red beaks. Adult males typically have a black and rose-colored ring around their necks, which females and juveniles lack. These birds are known for their loud, high-pitched calls, often heard before the birds themselves are seen.

Social and gregarious, parakeets usually form large flocks, which can be both a spectacle and a nuisance in equal measure. Their intelligence and playful behaviour endear them to many bird watchers, though they can sometimes be problematic for local agriculture, as they can raid crops.

High Speed Two (HS2) is the new high speed railway for Britain, if you have any questions or enquiries about our work, please contact our Helpdesk to find out more. You can sign up for regular updates in your local area at www.hs2inyourarea.co.uk.

What are we doing?

From mid July, we will be closing the A418 Oxford Road several times in order to bring the new road alignment we have been building into use. This will culminate in the reopening of the new section of road in November this year. Part of the old A418 Oxford Road will remain for residents access only.

This work begins with two weekend closures in July. There will then be a 2-week closure and a further 1-week closure later this year. There are 3 additional weekends identified as contingency in case the works are delayed due to circumstances beyond our control. For further details on what these works will entail, please refer to the construction programme summary on page 5.

In order to complete the required work and reopen the road as swiftly as possible, we will be working 24 hours a day with consent from Buckinghamshire Council during these periods.

At our last Fourth Tuesday Fellowship meeting we looked at some well-known prayers and their stories and perhaps you might like to share these.

If you are looking forward to a really busy day, you might like to use Sir Jacob.

If you are looking forward to a really busy day, you might like to use Sir Jacob Astley's prayer before the battle of Edgehill. All attempts at constitutional compromise between King Charles 1 and Parliament having broken down in early 1642, on Sunday October 23rd 1642 the armies of both factions faced each other at Edge Hill in southern Warwickshire. Sir Jacob, leading his mostly inexperienced and somewhat ill-equipped foot soldiers in the Royalist cause, rose at daybreak to see the massed Parliamentary forces across the 'no man's land'. This was his morning prayer:

"O Lord, thou knowest how busy I must be this day.

If I forget Thee, do not thou forget me"

Apart from his prayer, Sir Jacob is a little-known figure who died in relative obscurity, in contrast to the author of our next prayer who is known and venerated throughout the Christian community, though you may not recognise his baptismal name of Giovanni di Pietro di Bernardone. Born in 1181 and known to us as Francis of Assisi, he was canonized in 1228. To Francis we owe not only his beautiful prayer, but also our well-loved Christmas tradition of the stable nativity scene. Usually, we sing Francis' prayer to the beautiful tune *Channel of Peace*, composed by South African composer and writer Sebastian Temple [1928 – 1997].

Make me a channel of your peace; where there is hatred, let me bring your love, where there is injury, your pardon, Lord; and where there's doubt, true faith in you. Where there's despair in life, let me bring hope,
Where there is darkness, only light, and where there's sadness, ever joy.
O Master, grant that I may never seek so much to be consoled, as to console,
To be understood, as to understand, to be loved, as to love with all my soul.

Then, of course, the best known of all prayers, the prayer that Jesus taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy Name.

Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us

Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For Thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever.


