



Editorial – February Fill Dyke

Let us acknowledge the LORD; let us press on to acknowledge him.

As surely as the sun rises, he will appear;

He will come to us like the winter rains, like the spring rains that water the earth."

Hosea 6: 3-4

Thomas Tusser, about 1524 – 3 May 1580, was a poet and farmer who was best known for his instructional poem *Five Hundred Points of Good Husbandry* first published in 1557. The word husbandry in this context means good management of the house and garden. His book was an Elizabethan best seller and it was an equivalent of radio serial *The Archers* because it reminded farmers and growers when to plant, sow or prune. In those days most gardens were vegetable plots for most people.

During February he told his readers not to be lazy and get peas and beans sown. *In February, rest not for taking thine ease:*

get into the ground, with thy beans and thy peas.

Sow peas betimes, and betimes they will come:

the sooner, the better they fill up a room

He also called January "freeze pot" and February was "fill dyke". February fill dyke is not a common term for the second month now but it used to be popular. It refers to the snow melt and heavy rain causing flooding. Tusser seems to have been the source of various sayings, such as:

Christmas comes but once a year

A fool and his money are soon parted

He was also had strong opinions on cheese as many people do. He wrote ten characteristics the perfect cheese must have,

Not like Gehazi, i.e., dead white, like a leper

Not like Lot's wife, all salt

Not like Argus, full of eyes

Not like Tom Piper, "hoven and puffed"

Not like Crispin, leathery

Not like Lazarus, poor

Not like Esau, hairy

Not like Mary Magdalene, full of whey or maudlin

Not like the Gentiles, full of maggots

Not like a Bishop, made of burnt milk

I am not sure why a bishop should be made of burnt milk. It seems to have been a saying centuries ago but its meaning is lost. It could be that "bishop" was a drink. Answers please on a postcard.

Letter from Aston Sandford

Gwen Barton 7th November 1932 - 20th November 2022



Everyone in Aston Sandford congregation was saddened to learn of the death of Gwen Barton, who had attended our church regularly for over 40 years. A long-time resident of Haddenham, for nearly all those 40 years Gwen took an active part in the life of our church. Until fairly recently Gwen had been on the cleaning rota for years, indeed for many years she organised it. She was also a flower arranger: 'her' window was in the chancel and her arrangements were always lovely, and a bit different. In addition she occasionally played the organ for us. She

was a regular attender of and contributor to our APCM.

During lockdowns, when we zoomed our services, Gwen's family set up her tablet for her so she could join in. In the last few months she had not been able to attend church services so regularly. Her last visit was to our October service, which was our Harvest Festival, and it was so good to see her. Gwen celebrated her 90th birthday on 7th November, but her family had in fact organised a lovely party for her in October.

Gwen's well attended funeral took place on 13th December, at Bierton Crematorium, taken by the Venerable Dr Gordon Kuhrt, and afterwards at Bradmoor Farm.

Donations in memory of Gwen will go to pay for a sunken trampoline at Linslade Farm, where Gwen's late daughter Linda lived for the last years of her life; any excess monies will go to Florence Nightingale Hospice @ Home who looked after Gwen. Our Commemorative Tree

On 2nd December we planted in the churchyard what had been going to be our Jubilee Tree, now our Commemorative Tree. After much deliberation we decided to plant the native *acer campestre* commonly known as field maple. Field maples do well in alkaline soils such as ours, and is renowned for its golden autumn foliage. It has small, yellow green flowers which hang in clusters and the fresh winged seeds are attractively tipped with pink. It is attractive to all sorts of wildlife.

The tree arrived in late November and it was planted in the churchyard by Richard Belgrove and Nick Morgan on the morning of 2nd December. We have planted it in the part of the churchyard which we have designated as our wild area, until recently an area shaded by a large chestnut tree which had become dangerous. The Rev

Cassa Messervy very kindly came to watch the planting, together with myself and Laura Macpherson, and when the planting was done Cassa read a prayer of dedication. Field maples can last for well over 300 years, so long may it flourish in its new home.

Stone, Bishopstone or Hartwell may not boast an idyllic village green, but we do have the Stone War Memorial Recreation Ground. I am always delighted to see so many people using 'the park' whether for exercise, organised football, dog walking, playing with the kids or just quiet contemplation.

The Parish Council have, over many years, created a public space which is highly functional, appealing to all ages and simply a nice place to visit.

As many of you will be aware from the November edition of this magazine, the Stone Memorial Gates were unveiled one hundred years ago in 1922. The Parish Council have very recently overseen the cleaning of this unique memorial, ensuring that it remains a fitting tribute to all those local residents who paid the ultimate sacrifice in defending our liberty.

In the last few months, brand new goalposts have been installed in the park, replacing the old ones with a more contemporary design. These allow children and adults to play football, basketball or any other ball game which their imagination conjures. The gym area and perimeter path both remain very popular with local walkers, runners and fitness enthusiasts. The latter looks particularly impressive when it is lit up at night.

Keeping the War Memorial Recreation Ground in good condition takes a great deal of time and not inconsiderable expense. Councillor Roger Cantle has also worked tirelessly in the planning, planting and maintenance of trees which add so much to the park.

Finally, the Recreation Ground is probably an example of how many services are much better delivered locally and by local people. Things always seem to get much more complicated and difficult when big organisations become involved. But that's another story!

Interesting Local Residents, No.1

CANON VICTOR LORENZO WHITECHURCH, 1868-1933

Rector of Hartwell with Stone 1923-1931 and famous crime novelist



Canon Whitechurch was not only an eminent churchman but also a celebrated crime writer, producing twenty-four books, some of them never out of print, and a large number of short stories, published in the Strand Magazine, Pearson's Weekly, Boys' Own Paper and Railway Magazine. He is included with Dorothy Sayers, Agatha Christie and G K Chesterton in the front rank of classic crime writers.

Ordained at 23, various curacies, mainly in the Thames Valley, followed, and by 1904 he was already publishing short stories, but now began to produce a full length book every year as well. His


deep interest in and wide knowledge of Britain's railway system during this golden age of rail transport resulted in many stories linked to the railway, with titles such as "The Affair of the Corridor Express" and "The Murder on the Okehampton Line". A collection of short stories, "Thrilling Stories of the Railway" was published in 1912. He was also fascinated by the local topography, the chalk downlands, and was a keen amateur actor and conjuror - all these interests came together with clerical lore and his later Oxford connection to provide background for his writing. His artist wife, Florence Partridge, illustrated his books. Their only child, Bertha, born in 1903, also became an artist.

In 1913 he became Chaplain to the Bishop of Oxford, resigned for health reasons in 1923 and moved to the living of Stone. He stayed here until October 1931, when he became too unwell to continue, and died in Buxton in 1932. He produced at least eight books during his time in Stone, as well as carrying out his pastoral duties, being greatly admired for his able and forceful public speaking and eloquent and convincing sermons. He was also a prominent Freemason and took an active part in public life in the Aylesbury area'


Whitechurch was a superb constructor of mystery plots and was also one of the first crime writers to make a proper study of police procedures. His pet detective, the eccentric Thorpe Hazel, whose primary characteristics were shared with his creator, was "a slight, delicate-looking man, with pale face and refined features, light red hair, and dreamy blue eyes", was a book collector and railway enthusiast, a gentleman of independent means. He was a food faddist and addicted to physical culture, an extreme vegetarian and constantly practiced various strange "exercises".

None of these peculiarities stopped Thorpe Hazel getting his man, and he was as popular with the readers as the equally eccentric Sherlock Holmes or, later, the charming Peter Wimsey.

"I have heard about your faith"


The Service this year has been prepared by the Christian women of **TAIWAN** and is based on St. Paul's encouraging letter to the Ephesians.

Taiwan is an island rich in natural resources and culturally diverse. The women of Taiwan share the issues faced geographically, politically and socially and also their hopes for the future. Let us join with them as we give thanks for the beautiful island and people of Taiwan and encourage each other in our faith, just as Apostle Paul did in his letters.

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the Day is vast. An international committee is based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country.
