'Only Farmers Need Apply' Emigration to Canada from the Parish

Three men from the parish who are named on the local war memorials emigrated to Canada before the First World War, joined the forces there and then served in Europe. There were others who had moved to Australia and New Zealand, joined up there, and who then returned to this country with the forces and then serviced in France.

From the 1890s there was growth in emigration from Britain to Canada. America was becoming less attractive. This increased at the turn of the century up to the beginning of the First World War. The Canadian government pursued an aggressive immigration policy aimed at agricultural settlers and skilled men from Britain and other countries. Canada was seen as very attractive as it offered higher wages, better education and a healthier climate. Emigration was driven by poverty and unemployment in cities and rural areas like Buckinghamshire. Over 400,000 people went to Canada from Europe in 1912. Immigrants from Britain were given highest priority although the Canadian government may publicly denied it. Canada was attractive to farmers headed to the Prairies, who typically came from eastern and central Europe and many immigrants from Britain preferred to live in a city.

Clifford Sifton was Minister of the Interior for the Liberal government of Prime Minister Sir Wilfred Laurier and drove the policy. The government offered free homesteads to applicants who qualified. Sifton felt strongly that town dwellers, artisans, shopkeepers and labourers were not desirable immigrants as they did not make good pioneers and would increase the population of the major cities, add to unemployment.

"I think a stalwart peasant in a sheep-skin coat, born on the soil, whose forefathers have been farmers for ten generations, with a stout wife and a half-dozen children, is good quality. A Trades Union artisan who will not work more than eight hours a day and will not work that long if he can help it, will not work on a farm at all and has to be fed by the public when his work is slack is, in my judgement, quantity and very bad quantity."

In March 1906 the Daily Mail published a letter from a vicar asking wealthy people to pay for young men to emigrate to Canada. The passage from Liverpool to Toronto cost £6.19s.7d which many could not afford. In 1907 an emigration office was set up in London to recruit skilled weavers, boiler makers, carpenters,

machinists, and ship joiners to emigrate. The bureau was successful and recruited many men. It paid the costs of passage.

The three local men from the parish all had an agricultural background.

Enlisted 22nd September 1914 Valcartier Quebec, Canada. He had been baptised 17th January at Stone, and was a labourer. His parents were Francis and Drusilla Andrews. Francis was a cattleman on a local farm. His parents lived at Eythrope Road. His enlistment form states he was 5 foot 8 inches tall with a 35 inch chest and had a fair complexion, brown eyes and black hair. Entitled to 1914-15 star (medal). The attestation form states he was a member of the militia. He was reported missing on 5th May 1915 but not officially presumed dead until 14th August 1916.

Acting Sergeant 114289 Cecil Farmborough Beechey

Died 15th September 1916.aged 23 Commemorated at Vimy Memorial Pas de Calais France Born 1893 and commemorated at Stone War Memorial Gates



Battalion Canadian Mounted Rifles (Saskatchewan Regiment) He was born on 17th January 1893 at Stone and baptised there 5th March 1893. He was educated at Aylesbury Grammar School. Worked at Aylesbury Gas Company and then as a farmer. He moved to Canada in 1911 and worked in farming He enlisted in Canada and returned to England with his unit in October 1915.he went to France the following February. He was involved in what was described as "sharp encounters" and "hair breadth escapes", rising in rank to Acting Sergeant by September 1916 at the age of 23. His parents. William and Martha, received a letter from another local soldier called Trooper Turnham that they had lost their son. Before going on his last patrol he gave his ring to his Sergeant-Major.

Cecil returned safely only to be killed by a sniper's bullet. He was a popular man, well remembered in the village as a keen cricketer and footballer. He was well known for his geniality and comradeship. Prayers were said for his family at both Stone and Hartwell churches

The inscription on the Vimy Ridge memorial is as follows,

TO THE VALOUR OF THEIR COUNTRYMEN IN THE GREAT WAR AND IN MEMORY OF THEIR SIXTY THOUSAND DEAD THIS MONUMENT IS RAISED BY THE PEOPLE OF CANADA

He enlisted at Vancouver and his last address was Quilchena, British Columbia, Canada. Born 16 Jan 1893 Ford, a Baptist. He had been a farmer. His parents were Alfred & Sarah Elliott. His father was a cowman on farm. Next of kin - brother Jabez, Trapp Lake, PO, BC, Canada. The brothers probably emigrated together.





A Hundred Years of Change in the Village of Stone

As we approach Remembrance Day on November 10 (Service 10.45, Exhibition 11.30 - 5.30) here is a reminder of the changes in our village over the past century. When the First War ended the first priority was to welcome home Stone's serving soldiers and to remember those who had not come back. More than 100 names had appeared on the Stone Rolls of Honour and 22 had died. £600+ was raised by public subscription for the purchase of land from the Lees of Hartwell for



memorial recreation ground handsome memorial gates were designed by architect Clough Williams Ellis, nephew of Lady Smyth of St John's Lodge, Bishopstone Road, On November 12 1922 a huge crowd attended the unveiling and dedication of the gates. Seven names added in 1945. Bishopstone's were memorial was opened in June 1920. A memorial from the Stone Asylum is now in Stone Church.

The village was still mainly agricultural and the impoverished Lee family owned much of it, struggling to sell off or maintain farms, houses, land and crumbling tied cottages. They survived until 1938, when Ernest Cook bought house, parkland and estate. Villagers worked on the land, at the Hospital or cycled or took the bus into town to work - or shop, though most used Miss Piddington's stores and the White's butchery, both on Eythrope Road. Carter's shop and coal yard was opposite the school and is still our village shop and Post Office today. The Post Office had moved from The Elms to the Rose and Crown, then back to the general store opposite the Waggon, later Fox's grocery, then a bridal shop, now the Pine Shop. Most people grew their own vegetables and fruit – the old cottages had large gardens and there were allotments.

There were four places of worship – St John Baptist Church, the Methodist Chapel, the Hospital Chapel and the deteriorating little Gothic church at Hartwell, the Assumption of the Virgin Mary. The latter was damp and neglected, appeals for help failed and services ceased in the mid-30s. There were four pubs – the Bugle, the Waggon and Horses (now Jeera), the Rose and Crown and the County Arms opposite the church. Burials took place at the hospital burial ground opposite St John's and St John Baptist and Hartwell churchyards.

Plested's waggon makers and undertakers at the bottom of Eythrope Road provided the coffins.

The Village Hall, opened in 1911, continued to be the centre of social activity, meetings, plays and performances, and village and assylum football and cricket teams played on the new Ground as well as in the asylum grounds. The village children attended the 1870 Stone School and were joined by the older Bishopstone children, who traipsed up the lane in all weathers. Everyone enjoyed annual carnivals, horticultural shows and maypole dancing.



The number of cars rose very gradually – petrol was sold at Griffith's Garage next to the Rose and Crown and later there were pumps at the County Arms. The Piddingtons and Griffiths sold paraffin for household use. Stone petrol station came mid-century.

The County Pauper Lunatic Asylum was renamed Bucks

Mental Hospital in 1919 and many villagers worked there on the wards, in the grounds or in the kitchens. Until it closed in 1991 St John's was a vital part of Stone.

By 1939, despite the difficulties of the Lees, things had stabilized, but 6 years more of terrible warfare did its damage. Although Stone school was inundated with evacuees several bombs fell in and around the village and Hartwell was requisitioned by the army – local children followed the soldiers as they marched up to church on Sundays. The field by the Bugle Horn became a POW camp for Italians and Germans.

Many houses were built after the Second World War. New homes replaced Cromhamstone House, between Griffiths Garage and the shop, Stonecroft opposite the village hall, the old rectory opposite the County Arms and Plested's Yard. Flats were built on the sites of Griffith's garage, Tom Elliott's dairy by the Waggon and the White's butcher's shop. Badger's Rise replaced the County Arms. St John's Hospital was closed in 1991 and it and the staff accommodation opposite replaced by housing. Only the Hospital Chapel remains, still awaiting restoration. Hartwell House, now leased by the National Trust, is in its 30th year as a prestigious country house hotel and the little church, threatened with demolition after the roof lead was stolen in the 1940s, now partially restored and with a new roof, is under the care of the Churches Conservation Trust.

Peverel Court, behind the Bugle, owned from the early '30s by the Longford family and sold to an insurance company for the duration, was then purchased by the Hospital Board for offices, the wartime huts in the grounds being used for nurses' accommodation. In 1970 the village school moved in during building works to extend and improve the old school. Peverel was then occupied by the

Vale School for some years, then sold and restored. It is now, with recent appropriate additions, a large and friendly retirement home.

On the Bishopstone Road, St John's Lodge was used as Hospital accommodation over the years but is now a nursing home. There is a Brendoncare home at the back of the old St John's site so the village continues its tradition of care. Many of the older cottages and houses do still survive and despite the constant intrusion of the A418 the traditional Hartwell stone walls with fossil insets, the many trees and the school, hall, pubs and church still give the village its character... Much change, but much still to recognise – and enjoy.



NOVEMBER GARDENING

As the dark days of Winter are fast approaching take whatever opportunities there are to get into your gardens for a good tidy up. Sweep up all the leaves and at the same time have a really good look at all the trees and shrubs. There are always some dead shoots and branches which require cutting out, and now is also the ideal time to do any necessary pruning.

November is the season for planting bare rooted trees and shrubs although nowadays one can buy most of these plants growing in pots which can be planted out all year round.

There are three vegetable plantings which can be undertaken in November. My favourite is the Broad Bean which if planted in the middle of the month will generally produce a good early crop, without the troubles of black fly. At the same time plant Garlic. Very easy to grow. Set the cloves about 3 inches deep with the pointed tip pointing upwards, about 8 inches apart. As they take a while to grow, do not forget where they are planted.

Thirdly rhubarb can also be planted. This is a plant which could remain in the same position for many years, so do consider the site carefully and incorporate as much manure and compost as possible.

Although there have not been many frosts in November recently, it pays to be prepared just in case.
