



Letter from Aston Sandford

In my piece on Rectors in July this year I mentioned Nicholas Orme's splendid book *Going to Church in Medieval England* (Yale 2021). The book has a chapter called *The Seasons and the Year.* The author points out that between late June and late November there were no religious 'seasons', though there were a number of religious days, including of course that of St John the Baptist on Midsummer Day and St Michael on 29th September (the archangels were regarded as beings of light to keep the people safe from evil as the days get darker). In the fifteenth century new festivals were introduced during those months, including the Transfiguration of Jesus on 6th August and several feasts of the Virgin. There were however signs that the Church took notice at least of the passing of the seasons. Churches were decorated with flowers in the summer, especially on festival days. Birch boughs were brought into the church on Midsummer Day.

So what notice did the medieval church take of the harvesting of crops? 1st August, the feast of St Peter, was known as Lammas Day, and it is widely regarded as the original harvest festival. Orme says that the word *lammas* is an Anglo-Saxon word which seems to have signified the offering of loaves on that day, made from the first grain of the harvest. Indeed the on-line *Oxford Reference* describes the day as a traditional calendar festival in northern Europe, which marked the end of the hay harvest, when stock could be let into the meadows to graze, and the beginning of the grain harvest, while my own copy of the *Oxford Reference Dictionary* published some time ago refers to Lammas Day as an English harvest festival at which loaves made from the first ripe corn were consecrated.

Yet, Orme says, there is no sign that Lammas Day was regarded as a harvest festival (indeed one commentator believed that the name was derived from a feast of lambs), but as an 'offering day', on which Peter's Pence was due. The term Peter's Pence referred to the annual tribute of a penny which every householder of a certain value had to pay to the church, a requirement which originated in Anglo-Saxon times and was not discontinued until the Reformation. Orme also mentions some other days on which crops were blessed – eg apples were blessed on 25th July, St James' Day - but it was not known how far such blessings were done in church to harvest produce brought as offerings. Harvest was then a long drawn out event, indeed almost routine work, certainly more so than it was in the nineteenth century when the modern harvest festival began. And Orme points out that, as parish clergy in medieval times claimed one tenth of grain sheaves AND one tenth of all vegetable crops, including those grown in private gardens, harvest was to some extent something to argue about rather than to celebrate.

At Aston Sandford's Harvest Festival, to be held on 16th October this year, it is

traditional to have a Harvest Loaf (including a depiction of a harvest mouse) on display, as you will see in the attached photograph. It is rather nice to think that it is at least possible that that its presence is a nod to a custom first established in the medieval period.

Dinton Annual Beer Festival

A record number of people attended the seventh Annual Beer Festival, held in the gardens of the Seven Stars pub in Dinton on Saturday 20th August. During the afternoon, the cheerful family-based crowd basked in the fine weather and was entertained by some live music, while enjoying the selection of real ales and ciders on offer. Steph laid on a barbecue and Dinton Wines once again set up their stall selling the award winning locally produced Dinton Folly English quality sparkling wine.

Takings on the day were about £4000, which means we will be able to continue to donate a reasonable amount of money to local causes. During the last year we have donated over £3000 to various parish projects bringing the total donated by the Beer Festival to over £10,000 since the first festival in 2015.

A huge thank you must go to all the volunteers and sponsors, whose hard work and generosity make this event possible. This kindness of spirit, shown by the sponsors and volunteers working together, is what makes the Dinton Beer Festival such a successful and enjoyable community and family occasion.



Harvest time

Sadly, I have not counted them, but "Harvest" appears in eighty separate occasions throughout the Bible which tells us that it is a significant topic. Harvest was not once a year but, on several occasions, when people marked the changing seasons.

Three times in the year you shall hold a festival for me. You shall observe the festival of unleavened bread; as I commanded you, you shall eat unleavened bread for seven days at the appointed time in the month of Abib, for in it you came out of Egypt. No one shall appear before me empty-handed. You shall observe the festival of harvest, of the first fruits of your labour, of what you sow in the field. You shall observe the festival of ingathering at the end of the year when you gather in from the field the fruit of your labour.

Exodus 23:14-17

It was a celebration of thanks for God's goodness and also an opportunity to remember people who were in need.

When you are harvesting in your field and you overlook a sheaf, do not go back to get it. Leave it for the foreigner, the fatherless and the widow, so that the LORD your God may bless you in all the work of your hands.

with every kind of provision.

Our sheep will increase by thousands,
by tens of thousands in our fields;

"Our humble, thankful hearts"

"We Plough the Fields and Scatter" is a favourite hymn at harvest festivals. It was originally a German hymn written by the poet Matthias Claudius, and called "Wir pflügen und wir streuen". It was published in 1782, and set to music in 1800, and later translated into English by Jane Montgomery Campbell in 1861.

She was born in Paddington, the daughter of the curate of St James's Church, Paddington, London, and rector of Little Steeping, Lincolnshire. After her early years in London, she moved to Bovey Tracey near Newton Abbot, and remained there until her death. She was a gifted linguist and German scholar. She also made an early translation of Silent Night. Verse 3 was later revised to make it better suited to the harvest in *Hymns Ancient and Modern*,

Americans would sing, "We plow the fields..." but that does not look right to me although that spelling is used in the King James' Bible. I still half think that "scatter" means run away!

We plough the fields, and scatter the good seed on the land;

But it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand: He sends the snow in winter, the warmth to swell the grain, The breezes and the sunshine, and soft refreshing rain.

Chorus All good gifts around us Are sent from heaven above, Then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord For all His love.

He only is the maker of all things near and far; He paints the wayside flower, He lights the evening star; The winds and waves obey Him, by Him the birds are fed; Much more to us, His children, He gives our daily bread.





THE PLANTS IN DINTON CHURCHYARD

A survey of the plants in Dinton churchyard was conducted in July 2012. Over 100 types of plants (including trees) were identified. The survey in July would not identify many spring flowers — snowdrops, daffodils, aconites, primroses and cowslips. Although none of these are rare, the large number of species is significant. No herbicides are used in the churchyard, except on the cobbled path, thus allowing many plants to grow successfully that will not be found in the nearby fields. The wide variety of plants should result in a wide variety of insects, since certain insects are only to be found on specific plants. In turn, the insects are food for birds and bats. So, the regime of using no herbicides, together with the relatively infrequent mowing of grass (monthly is the norm) has resulted in an environment closely in harmony with nature.

If any readers are interested in wildflowers, Dinton churchyard is a good location to see them. There are too many plants for all to be mentioned, but here are a selected few:

Dinton Almshouses and Privies



The Almshouses on the left side of the photo were situated on the flat pieces of land next to the southern churchyard wall, these properties owned by the church fulfilled the same function as Almshouses with the church allowing old and poor people to live in the houses.

They became unfit for habitation and were demolished in the 1920's, with the stone being used in the construction of the Bernard Hall in Cuddington.

Inside the churchyard wall there remains a building which used to be privies.


